Through the iroko tree, our culture is rooted in the soil of our land and from these roots it derives its strength.

IROKO Theatre Company was formed primarily to nurture and uphold the African culture, which we believe, just like the iroko tree, will never never die!

IROKO Theatre Company, winner of The Guardian Charity Award for its 'innovative approach to education' was formed in 1996 by Alex Oma-Pius FRSA. The company advances the education of members of the public who are deprived and under-privileged as a result of their socio-economic backgrounds, geographical location, physical and/or mental disabilities in the arts and in particular but not exclusively in African arts. The Company uses traditional African theatre art forms incorporating oral storytelling, drama, music, dance, masquerade and visual arts to raise awareness and preserve knowledge of African arts, culture and history. IROKO takes its work to those areas in the wider community where such cultural art forms would normally not be seen.

In 2009, Alex conceived and designed IROKO Family Edutainment Project (IFEP). The project is a programme of participatory workshops in the London Boroughs of Barking & Dagenham and Redbridge to enable families to experience high quality learning in a fun and stimulating environment. The project aims to enhance family relationships, support family life, increase communication skills, bridge intergenerational divides and provide participants and organisations with valuable opportunities to gain transferable skills. The range of activites and support provided through the programme will include:

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Oral Storytelling Performance

A storytelling session by Alex Oma-Pius FRSA

Oral storytelling is an element of traditional African theatre. Seen as a performance art, it involves using most of the elements and techniques of African theatre. (See separate sheet).

There are different categories of traditional African fables, myths



and legends. There are the "That-is-Why" stories that tell us for instance, why the leopard has spots; why the zebra has stripes or why the monkey has a tail, etc.! There are also the "Problem Solving or Riddles" stories that are meant to test our mental agility and general knowledge of our heritage and natural world. The common trickster characters are the Monkey, the Rabbit, the Leopard, the Tortoise, the Hare, the Fox and the famous Ghanaian trickster, Ananse, the Spider, spelt differently like (Anansi, Anancey, Anansey, etc.).

The fundamental principle of a good traditional African tale is that it should informally educate and entertain – "Edutainment" using drama, songs, music, dance, etc. Through these stories, knowledge and wisdom are passed down and a community's world view, norms and values are shaped. For example, acceptable do's and don'ts; the comeuppances for greed, treachery, unnecessary curiosity and also, the rewards for hard work and good behaviour, etc.

The fundamental principle of a good traditional African tale is that it should informally educate and entertain – "Edutainment" using drama, songs, music, dance, etc. Through these stories, knowledge and wisdom are passed down and a community's world view, norms and values are shaped.





For example, acceptable do's and don'ts; the come-uppances for greed, treachery, unnecessary curiosity and also, the rewards for hard work and good behaviour, etc.

The values and themes which most of the stories espouse are not particularly unique to the continent but what is unique is the natural, supernatural and magical world from which the stories emanate. In African fables, spirits, animals, objects, plants and trees can have human features and characteristics - they can talk, walk, dance and sing!

What is also unique to African stories is their ability to weave suspense and spring heartbreaking surprises, magic and at times, unbelievable endings. These help to fire the listeners' imagination so much so that they have lots and lots of ideas about how a story might end, and as the story unfolds, listeners are constantly compelled to change their imagined plots and endings!

Endings of some African tales might be considered distasteful to the Western mind. But that is Africa, a continent where, good deeds and hard work traditionally were handsomely rewarded and disloyalty and dishonesty, fiercely punished. Through historical experiences and the ingrained belief in the supernatural, it is still some African peoples' opinion that the human being is helpless when faced with the antics and surprises of Mother Nature! That is why, in the mythical story of Olurunbi, like the sacrificial lamb, a mother offered her one and only begotten child for sacrifice in order to honour her promise to the gods and protect her community from doom!

The use of poetic languages and imageries, beautifully coined from the natural world of Africa, together with the tonal and musical nature of most African languages has also helped to make African stories and writing authentic.

In traditional African village settings, stories are the Ninetendos and Play Stations that occupy the times for the development of the creative and imaginative mind of the African child. They are what turn the child from a couch potato to a living soul filled with bewildering imagination, spirituality and moral rectitude.

Clay Modelling

- 1. The length of your thumb is from the tip of the thumb up to the second joint.
- 2. The length of your thumb is exactly the length of your lips corner to corner.
- 3. The length of your thumb is exactly the length of your nose.
- 4. The length of your thumb is exactly the length of your eye brow.
- 5. The distance between your two eyes is the thickness of your thumb.
- 6. The distance between the corner of your eyes to your ear, is the length of your thumb.







IROKO Family Edutainment Project AFRICAN TEXTILE ARTS

Historical Background

Africa has a long history of fabric design and production dating back to the early days of beating and weaving fibre, bark and grass such as raffia and hemp to weaving of cotton. Extensive work has been done in the production of dyed textiles particularly in West Africa. There are two main methods today known as Tie and Dye and Batik painting.

Before the availability of imported factory made dyes, locally produced vegetable dyes were used to give colour to raffia and cotton cloth, as well as in the tanning of leather and also in the preparation of cosmetics. Red, Yellow and Black dyes were extracted from the roots, stems, bark, leaves, flowers and fruits of many different plants.

In West Africa, Red dyes were obtained from a variety of guinea corn (sorghum), known in the Hausa language as 'dawa' and Yoruba as 'oka'. Also from the powdered dried leaves of henna, the bark and roots of the African rosewood. Yellow dyes came from the bark of the shingle-wood tree and the rhizome of turmeric. The best known and most widely used vegetable dye was Indigo (Blue), from the tall bushy plants known as indigofera. This famous dye is believed to have been discovered and first used in India some four thousand years ago.

The whole process of Tie and Dye techniques has been simplified to engage teachers, parents and children as a fun activity.

A range of complex designs and patterns can be achieved in the making of Tie and Dye. For example, Zig-Zag lines might suggest lightening, snakes, water, fire or the mane of horses, antelopes, etc. A circled dot often refers to the sun as a source of great vitality. he symbolic use of patterns is widespread in Africa. Design motifs have been long developed in Africa, each design with intrinsic value and meaning e.g. the Ghana 'kente', Yoruba 'adire', batik painting in Kenya & South Africa.

LOTTERY FUNDED

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AFRICAN TEXTILES (Tie & Die Techniques)

Requirements:

- 3 medium size bowls (one for yellow, one for red and one for blue dye)
- Access to hot water or an electric kettle
- Fabric (perferably white cotton) cut to size 15" square per child
- String cut to 10" in length per child
- Gloves
- 3 Party cups (a cup for each colour dye)
- 3 teaspoons (a teaspoon for each colour dye)
- Common / table salt
- Dyes (primary colours) yellow, red and blue
- Chemicals Urea and Soda ash

Preparation:



Bowl 'A' Yellow



Bowl 'B' Red



Bowl 'C' Blue

Steps: 1. 3 teaspoon full of common salt into each bowl

- 2. 1 teaspoon full (5 grams) of Urea into each bowl
- 3. 1 teaspoon full (5 grams) of Soda Ash into each bowl
- 4. 1 teaspoon full (5 grams) of Dye into each bowl (for yellow, red and blue dyes)
- 5. 5 party cup full of hot water into each bowl to dissolve and mix the salt, dye and chemicals

THE DYE MIXTURE IS NOW READY FOR EACH COLOUR

- **Steps:** 6. Fold fabric to the desired patterns and tie with a string.
 - 7. Dip fabric into dyes for the desired effects making sure the colours over lap.

Finishing:

- **Steps:** 8. Hang the dyed fabric to dry
 - 9. Steam iron to fix the dyes.

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Some Tie & Dye Folding Techniques

To achieve the patterns on the pictures below, please follow the step by step guide under each picture.


- a) Pick up a 15" square fabric.
- b) Point to the centre of the fabric, pinch and lift up.
- c) Fold the fabric in half and tie at the middle to achieve symmetrical patterns.



- a) Pick up a 15" square fabric and fold in half into a rectangle.
- b) Fold in half again into a square (you now have 4 corners), 3 loose corners and one dead end.



- c) Fold the fabric into a fan pattern (forward & backward) from any corner to the opposite. From the dead end, you will achieve an X-pattern and from the loose corners, you will achieve the diamond pattern (as shown above).
- a) Pick up a 15" square fabric.
- b) Fold in half into a rectangle and half again into a square.
- c) Fold into a triangle.
- d) Fold and tie at the middle of fabric.



To achieve symmetrical patterns, always tie the fabric at the middle.








